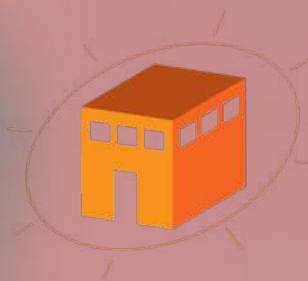
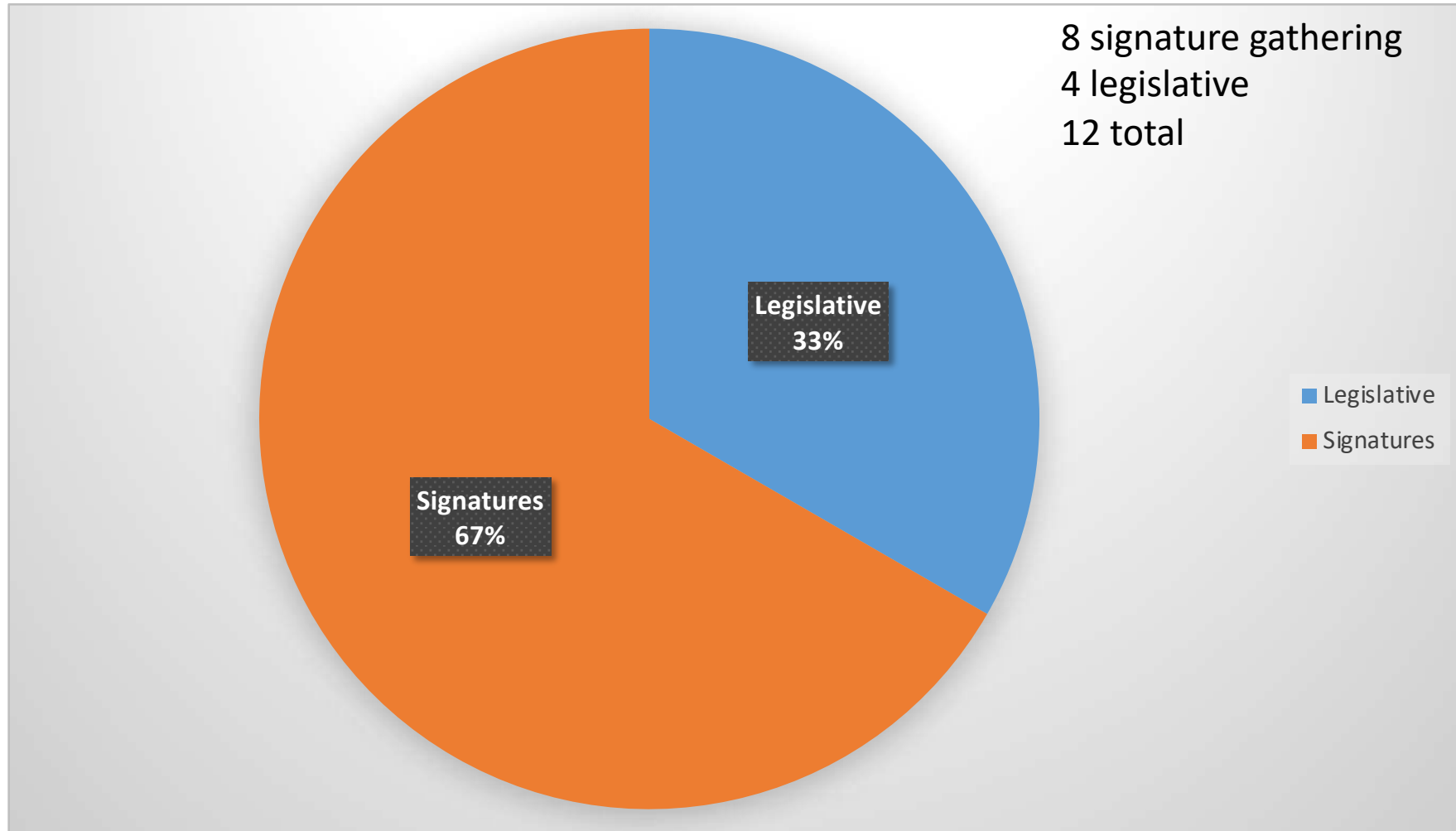

Prop 14:

“The CA Stem Cell Research, Treatments, & Cures Initiative of 2020”

SUMMARY: Authorizes \$5.5 billion in state general obligation bonds to fund grants from the California Institute of Regenerative Medicine to educational, non-profit, and private entities for: (1) stem cell and other medical research, therapy development, and therapy delivery; (2) medical training; and (3) construction of research facilities.

Dedicates \$1.5 billion to fund research and therapy for Alzheimer’s, Parkinson’s, stroke, epilepsy, and other brain and central nervous system diseases and conditions.

Limits bond issuance to \$540 million annually.

Appropriates money from General Fund to repay bond debt, but postpones repayment for first five years.

Prop 15:

“The California Schools and Local Communities Funding Act of 2020”

SUMMARY: Increases funding for K-12 public schools, community colleges, and local governments by requiring that commercial and industrial real property be taxed based on current market value.

Exempts from this change: residential properties; agricultural properties; and owners of commercial and industrial properties with combined value of \$3 million or less.

Increased education funding will supplement existing school funding guarantees.

Exempts small businesses from personal property tax; for other businesses, exempts \$500,000 worth of personal property.

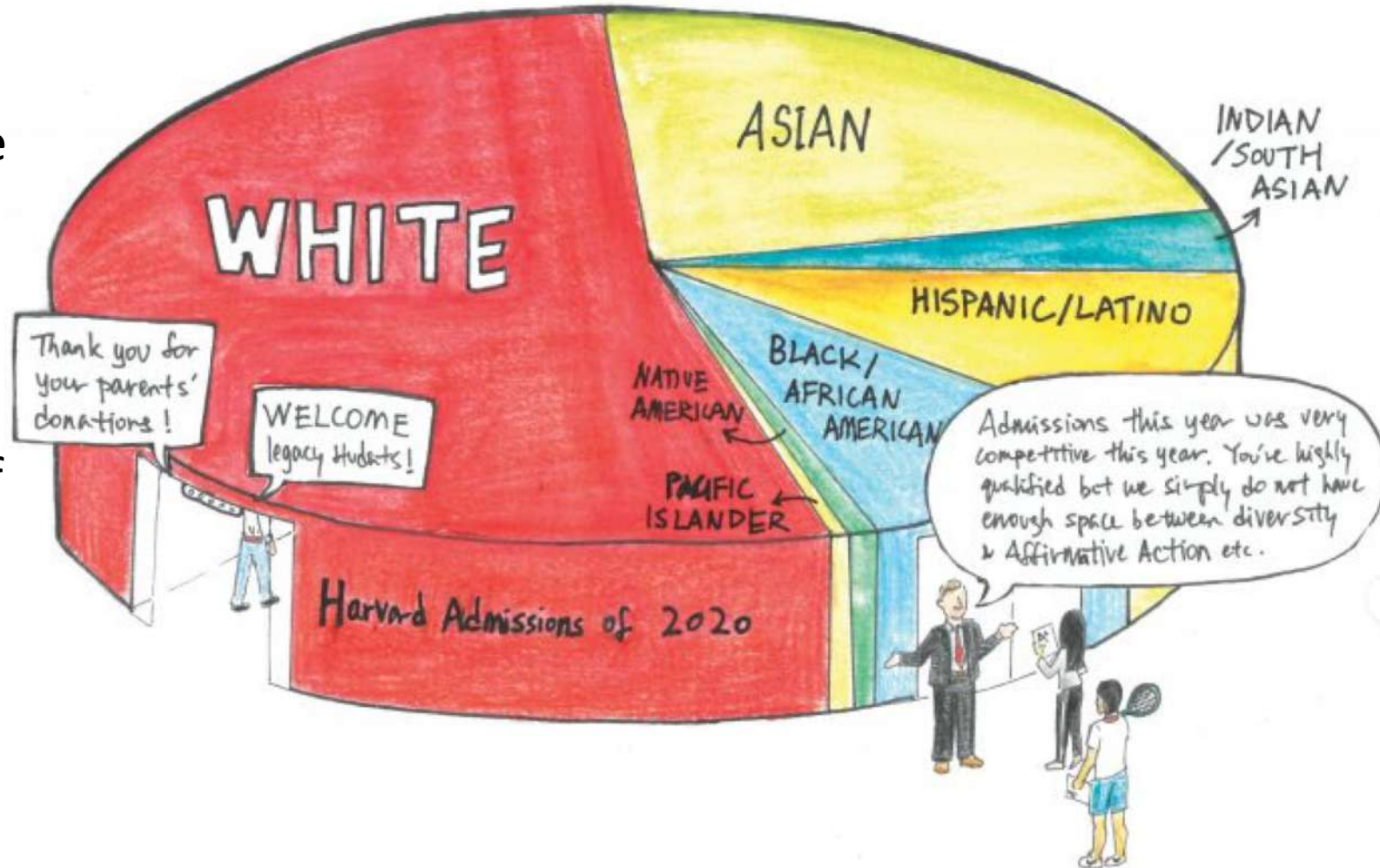

Prop 16:

“Assembly Constitutional Amendment No. 5”

SUMMARY: Repeals provisions enacted pursuant to Proposition 209 in 1996 that prohibit the state and all institutions and political subdivisions thereof from discriminating against, or granting preferential treatment to, any individual or group on the basis of race, sex, color, ethnicity, or national origin in the operation of public employment, public education, or public contracting.



SUMMARY: Permits a person who is on parole for the conviction of a felony to register to vote and to vote.

Prop 18: “Assembly Constitutional Amendment No. 4”

SUMMARY: Permits a United States (US) citizen who is 17 years of age, is a resident of the state, and who will be at least 18 years of age at the time of the next general election to vote in any primary or special election that occurs before the next general election in which the citizen would be eligible to vote if at least 18 years of age.

Prop 19: “Home Protection for Seniors, Severely Disabled, Families, Wildfire and Natural Disasters Act”

SUMMARY: This measure provides additional property tax benefits to eligible homeowners who want to move while eliminating other property tax benefits currently provided to families through the parent-child and grandparent-grandchild change in ownership exclusion.

First, this constitutional amendment lifts restrictions to allow more homeowners to take advantage of base year value transfers available under existing law. Second, this constitutional amendment repeals the existing parent-child and grandparent-grandchild exclusion and replaces that exclusion with a narrower exclusion that allows this tax benefit only if the property is a principal residence and the transferee will live in the home as their principal residence (i.e., family home and/or family farm).

This constitutional amendment allows age 55+ or disabled homeowners, and disaster-impacted homeowners, to move anywhere in California and take their Proposition 13 tax savings with them via a base year value transfer.

Prop 19

Higher Property Taxes for Inherited Property, Lower Property Taxes for Some Moves, Funding for Fighting Wildfires

- Raises property taxes to be based on current value when property is inherited, unless heir lives in the home.
- Allows people over 55, severely disabled, or victim of a natural disaster to move to a new home and keep existing low property tax.
- Net increase in taxes goes towards fighting wildfires.

Prop 20:

“Reducing Crime and Keeping California Safe Act of 2018”

SUMMARY: This measure seeks to Reform the parole system so violent felons are not released early from prison, strengthen oversight of post release community supervision and tighten penalties for violations of terms of post release community supervision;

Reform theft laws to restore accountability for serial thieves and organized theft rings;

Expand DNA collection from persons convicted of drug, theft and domestic violence related crimes to help solve violent crimes and exonerate the innocent.

Prop 21: “Rental Affordability Act”


SUMMARY: Amends state law to allow local governments to establish rent control on residential properties over 15 years old.

Allows rent increases on rent-controlled properties of up to 15 percent over three years from previous tenant’s rent above any increase allowed by local ordinance.

Exempts individuals who own no more than two homes from new rent-control policies.

In accordance with California law, provides that rent-control policies may not violate landlords’ right to a fair financial return on their property.

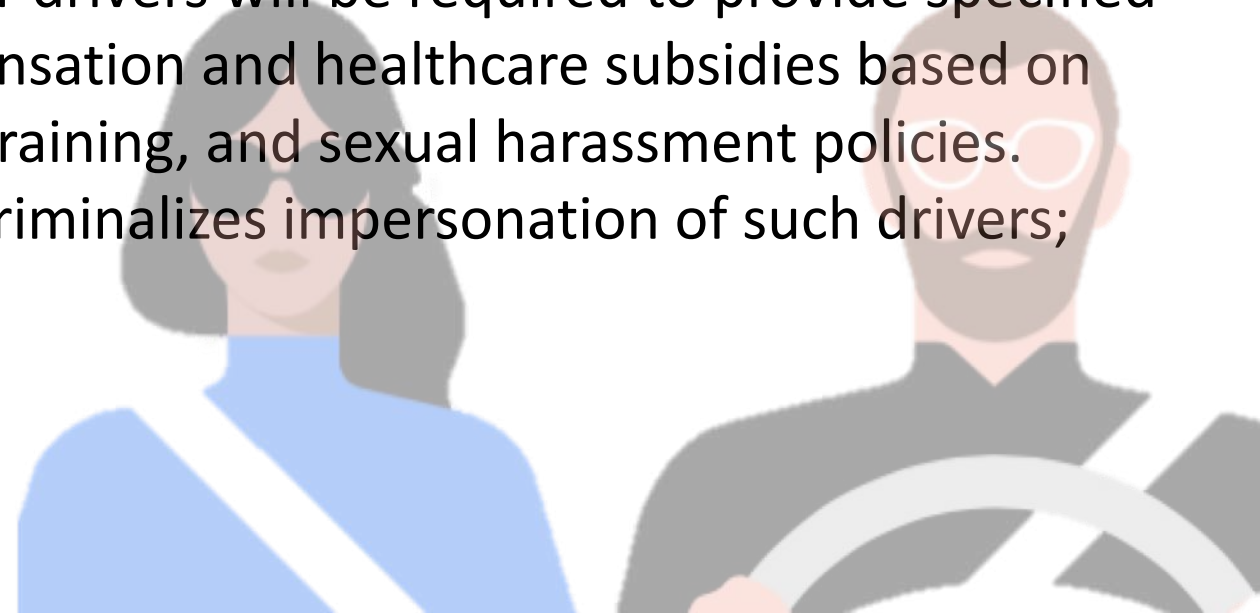

Prop 22: “Protect App-Based Drivers and Services Act”

SUMMARY: Establishes different criteria for determining whether app-based transportation (rideshare) and delivery drivers are “employees” or “independent contractors.”

Independent contractors are not entitled to certain state-law protections afforded employees—including minimum wage, overtime, unemployment insurance, and workers’ compensation.

Instead, companies with independent-contractor drivers will be required to provide specified alternative benefits, including: minimum compensation and healthcare subsidies based on engaged driving time, vehicle insurance, safety training, and sexual harassment policies. Restricts local regulation of app-based drivers; criminalizes impersonation of such drivers; requires background checks.

Prop 23: “Protect the Lives of Dialysis Patients Act”

SUMMARY: Requires at least one licensed physician on site during treatment at outpatient kidney dialysis clinics; authorizes Department of Public Health to exempt clinics from this requirement due to shortages of qualified licensed physicians if at least one nurse practitioner or physician assistant is on site.

Requires clinics to report dialysis-related infection data to state and federal governments. Requires state approval for clinics to close or reduce services.

Prohibits clinics from discriminating against patients based on the source of payment for care.

Prop 24:

“The California Privacy Rights and Enforcement Act of 2020”

SUMMARY: Permits consumers to: (1) prevent businesses from sharing personal information; (2) correct inaccurate personal information; and (3) limit businesses’ use of “sensitive personal information”—such as precise geolocation; race; ethnicity; religion; genetic data; union membership; private communications; and certain sexual orientation, health, and biometric information.

Prohibits businesses’ retention of personal information for longer than reasonably necessary.

Triples maximum penalties for violations concerning consumers under age

Prop 25: “SB 10 (2018) – Money Bail System”

SUMMARY: If this petition is signed by the required number of registered voters and timely filed, a referendum will be placed on the next statewide ballot requiring a majority of voters to approve a 2018 state law before it can take effect.

The 2018 law replaces the money bail system with a system for pretrial release from jail based on a determination of public safety or flight risk, and limits pretrial detention for most misdemeanors.
