

Voter Survey Overview



More than half of voter survey respondents feel California (63%) and Sacramento (58%) are heading in "the right direction."



When initially asked about allowing 16- and 17- year old students to vote in school board elections, 45% of respondents support the idea, while 6% were neutral.

After hearing several arguments for and against the idea, **10%** of survey respondents became more supportive of youth voting in school board elections, increasing support to **55%**.



52% of voter survey respondents found the "Trending" argument convincing for supporting youth voting.



Council districts with HIGHEST likelihood of supporting Youth Vote include:

District 3 – Jeff Harris 57%

District 4 – Steve Henson 61%

District 5 – Jay Schenirer 64%












The Republican Party










